Subject: 2022 Community Project and Investment Grants,

Report CSD22-002

Purpose

A report to recommend the award of the Community Project Grants in the amount of \$15,525 and the Community Investment Grants in the amount of \$196,980 to eligible community groups in 2022.

Recommendations

That Council approve the recommendations outlined in Report CSD22-002 dated March 7, 2022 of the Commissioner of Community Services, as follows:

- a) That the recommendations of the 2022 Community Project Grants Committee in the total amount of \$15,525 be allocated to various community groups as described in Appendix A;
- b) That the recommendations of the Community Investment Grant Advisory Committee in the total amount of \$196,980 to be allocated to various local charitable and Not-For-Profit organizations (NFP's) as described in Appendix B;
- c) That the remaining surplus Community Grant funds be used for emerging 2022 community requests, and be brought back to the Community Investment Grant Advisory Committee for review and subsequent approval by Council at a later date; and
- d) That any unused Community Grant funds at the end of the year be carried over to 2023 and used for the 2023 Community Investment Grant budget.

Budget and Financial Implications

The recommendations can be accommodated within the approved \$20,350 Community Project Grants budget and the approved \$212,642 Community Investment Grants budget.

Background

Community Grants Application Process

Both the Investment and Project Grant application processes were completed through an online portal on the City's website. Staff regularly updated the website to reflect the process and published on the City's Social Media pages and through other media sources to ensure all potential applicants were aware of the process and the grant opportunity.

2022 Community Project Grants

A Staff committee with expertise and experience in the four major program areas was formed to reflect the approved funding streams: Arts/Culture/ Heritage, Environment, Health and Social Services, and Recreation and Sports.

The Committee met and reviewed the applications and applied the eligibility and evaluation criteria to award funding to successful eligible groups. The Committee recommends the grant allocations as outlined in Appendix A - 2022 Proposed Community Project Grant Funding. The total allocation for 2022 is \$15,525. The maximum grant is \$1,000.

The Community Services Department received twenty applications for Project Grants, including four new applicants. Of the 20 applications 2 organizations were deemed ineligible. Staff are aware based on conversations and feedback from eligible organizations and community groups that Covid-19 negatively affected the number of applications submitted for 2022. Groups were not confident that events and programs would be able to be run or be operated. This was particularly evident in the Community Project Grant stream which is intended for smaller organizations and smaller programs and events.

The following chart illustrates how the Project Grant program has evolved since 2019.

Eligibility Criteria for Community Project Grants

Through the formal application process, community groups were required to meet the following eligibility criteria as approved by Council:

- Be new or existing, incorporated or unincorporated Not For Profit, or Neighbourhood Associations
- Be located and conduct the majority of activities within the geographic boundaries of the City of Peterborough

The following are considered ineligible:

- Organizations receiving Community Investment Grants or Community Service Grants
- Individuals
- For-profit businesses
- Organizations with political affiliation

- Organizations serving as funding sources for others, e.g., Service Clubs
- Faith organizations where services/activities include the promotion and/or required adherence to a faith
- Hospitals, clinic-based services, or medical treatment programs
- Fund-raising events
- School boards, primary and secondary schools, post-secondary institutions
- Programs within legislated mandates of other government or City departments
- Provincial/national organizations unless a local chapter exists to service the residents of Peterborough
- Organizations receiving 80% or more of funding from senior levels of government
- Organizations that conduct the majority of their activities outside of the City
- Costs for major capital equipment/renovations and minor renovations; and financing of deficits

Through the application process, community groups must demonstrate:

- One or more City priorities and participant priorities within target sectors
- Community need for proposed activity or service
- Community support (funding support or sponsorship from other organizations, local businesses, industry, service clubs)
- Community benefit/impact
- Financial need (operating surpluses or reserve accounts should not exceed 25% of total operating without acceptable explanation, e.g., capital campaign)
- Sound financial management and revenue generation (accurate records, responsible budget, various sources of income; if deficit, then reduction plan)
- Accountability/mechanism for evaluation (identification of key performance measures and outcomes)
- Feasibility (organization's ability to complete the proposed activity or service)
- Evidence of community collaboration, partnerships
- Impact of previous year's funding support.

Community Investment Grants Program

A community-based Grant Advisory Committee was appointed in 2022 for a two-year term (2022/2023) and a motion to appoint the members was passed by Council on January 31, 2022.

The committee reviewed the applications and applied the eligibility and evaluation criteria. After the individual ratings were tallied, the sub-committees merged in a final committee meeting, and collectively recommended by motion, the grant allocations as outlined in Appendix B -2022 Proposed Community Investment Grant Funding.

2021 Investment Grant Applications

This year, the City received twelve applications for Investment Grant funding. All twelve applications received funding. Due to the low number of applications received and the

Committee's evaluation of those applications, it was apparent that a surplus of funds would be produced. The Committee discussed how best to approach this unique occurrence and recommended a motion to Council addressing the surplus. The recommendation was for the funds to go towards emerging issues that present themselves later in 2022 and for those potential options to be brought back to the Committee for review. If deemed eligible and appropriate, the Committee would recommend to Council that this remaining funding be used at that time. The Committee passed a further recommendation that any unused Community Grant funds in 2022 should be carried over and used to supplement the 2023 Community Investment Grants budget.

The following chart illustrates how the Investment Grant program has evolved since 2019.

2022 Investment Grant Multi-Year Funding

In addition to this year's grants, twelve organizations have been allocated funding based on previous years' approvals for multi-year funding as detailed in Appendix C, Community Investment Grant Confirmed Multi-year Funding. Six organizations requested multi-year funding in 2022 and three are being recommended for multi-year funding.

Eligibility Criteria

Through the formal application process, applicants must meet the following eligibility criteria as approved by Council:

- Be NFP's that are located, and conduct the majority of their activities within the geographic boundaries of the City of Peterborough
- Have sustained a history of activity over two years prior, normally achieved as past recipient of at least two Community Project Grants
- Have been in existence for five years if requesting multi-year funding
- Have demonstrated sound financial management and good standing with the City of Peterborough and be able to demonstrate that they provide those services and programs in an effective, accessible open and inclusive manner

The following are considered ineligible applicants:

- Organizations receiving Community Project Grants or Community Service Grants
- Individuals
- For-profit businesses
- Organizations with political affiliation
- Organizations serving as funding sources for others, e.g., Service Clubs
- Faith-based organizations where services/activities include the promotion and/or required adherence to a faith
- Hospitals, clinic-based services or medical treatment programs
- Fund-raising events

- School boards, primary and secondary schools, post-secondary institutions
- Programs within legislated mandates of other government or city departments
- Provincial/national organizations unless a local chapter exists to service the residents of Peterborough
- Organizations receiving 80% or more of funding from senior levels of government
- Organizations that conduct the majority of their activities outside of the City
- Costs for major capital equipment/renovations and minor renovations; and financing of deficits.

Summary

This is the sixteenth year the Community Grant Programs have been operating under the current model to support not for profit organizations in their on-going activities to enrich local quality of life. Following the evaluation criteria approved by Council, this report recommends the disbursement of \$15,525 to qualified applicants in the Community Project Grant Program, and \$196,980 in the Community Investment Grant Program.
